REACH on the Indo-Pak Line of Control.

More than any other time in our history, the challenge of melding the two Indias occupies the public discourse as it must.

Rich and poor, urban and rural, upper caste and tribal, the idea of India waits to be redefined. The creation of The Foundation seeks to influence this redefinition into one that envisions a totally inclusive India, an India where, through quality education, every Indian starts with the same opportunity. Thus was born our spearhead initiative, **REACH** (Restoring Equality through the Education and Advancement of Children).

The idea of REACH is to have classrooms in the best schools of this country full of children from every region of the land. Children who would otherwise never have the chance to break out of their communities. Locked away by geography, history, politics, or simply, poverty, REACH seeks to give bright, deserving children ten-year scholarships, from Std 6 to graduation.

In 2007, the first area we chose to select students from was the **Andaman and Nicobar Islands**. The immense geographical divide between the mainland and the archipelago has left the islanders with an ingrained sense of separateness at best, a sense of inferiority at worst. Executing a simple plan – selecting five children from the pool eligible for admission into Std 6, proved fiendishly difficult in the 38 inhabited islands of the region.


Working with the Directorate of Education, the logistical challenge, from reaching application forms to every island to conducting group sessions, was daunting with 20-hour boat trips, an 8-month monsoon and primitive

communications proving imposing hurdles. We even created a radio ad in Hindi explaining the scholarship and played it across the islands! Today five children from the region – Matrena, Bindu, Pratima, Rukhsar and Jinu, are in various colleges across the country after having finished their Std 10 from Rishi Valley school, the country's top ranked boarding school.

In 2011 we decided to launch REACH II in the Kashmir Valley. The Kashmir initiative had its own challenges. The threat of militancy (bombs went off in Lal Bazar in Srinagar on one of our trips), distance (braving treacherous roads, our team reached the Indo-Pak border with application forms), and orthodoxy (the school chosen for this scholarship initiative is co-educational), six children – four girls and two boys, were selected and have completed their first year at the Sahyadri School (a sister school of Rishi Valley), near Pune. The next region REACH moves to is Manipur and Meghalaya in the north-east.

Where better to start bridging the divide between the two Indias than in the classroom. The dream is to nurture hundreds of children from different parts of the country; children entering the world, educated, informed, full of the certitude that the world can be one, so that they in turn will never shy away from walking up to the forgotten, taking them by the hand and setting them on a deeper, richer journey.






